
Fast Facts: Wisconsin Women in the Population

Female Population by Race & Ethnicity, WI & US



In 2017*, Wisconsin's population was 81% white compared 61% nationally; while in Wisconsin's Hispanic and African American minority groups each account for about 6% of the population, less than half national statistics for these populations.

Still, Wisconsin is following the national trend toward increasing racial and ethnic diversity. In 2017, the state's population was 81% white, compared to 84% (2010 Census) and 89% (2000 Census). The greatest growth has been for the state's Hispanic and Asian populations.

Highlights

- Wisconsin is home to over
 2.9 Million women & girls
 —up 2% since 2010.
- The state's population remains less diverse than that of the U.S. population as a whole.
- This racial/ethnic mix is changing. This is particularly evident when looking at the youth population.
- The median age for women in racial and ethnic minority groups cluster under age 35, compared 45 for white women.

What opportunities occur as Wisconsin's increasingly diverse youth population comes of age?


About the Women's Council



The shift to a more diverse population is evident when viewing the state's population of women and girls by age group. By age group, each consecutively younger population of women and girls is more diverse, with girls under age 18 approaching the U.S. population mix. Currently, about one-quarter of Wisconsin's population is under age 18, with nearly one-third under age 25.


Percent of Females in the Population by Age Group, Wisconsin, 2017



WOMEN'S MEDIAN AGE

Different ages, different stages. Women in Wisconsin split into two distinct age profiles when viewed by racial and ethnic groups, see Timeline. The median ages for women of color—here reflected as Hispanic, Asian, African American and Native American women—all fall under age 35; while for white women the median age is a decade older at age 45. Women under age 35 compared to those age 45, likely find themselves, on average, at different stages in the lifecycle—such as educational attainment, family and childbearing, healthcare and workforce attachment. This distinction suggests important public policy and program implications for ensuring all Wisconsin women can achieve full social and economic participation in the state.
